In the second quarter of 2023 the Foundation welcomed seven new Advisory Board members. Our <u>Advisory Board</u> has rich expertise in business, academia, the arts, national security, education, health and science.

In June the Advisory Board convened for the first time since its <u>renewal</u>, meeting Foreign Minister Penny Wong, Trade and Tourism Minister Don Farrell, Assistant Foreign Minister Tim Watts and Immigration Minister Andrew Giles.

In June Foreign Minister Penny Wong also announced the recipients of our <u>2022-23 grants round</u>.

Darwin International Dragon Boat Festival

In June the Foundation supported the City of Darwin to deliver its inaugural International Dragon Boat Festival on Sunday, 4 June 2023.

The race included teams from Australia and China, as well as international delegations from Indonesia, and Timor-Leste. The related festival supported City of Darwin engage its sister cities with a series of sport, cultural and trade events, and showcased Darwin's multicultural origins with over a century of Chinese migration.

FIRST NATIONS FOCUS

Charles Darwin University Indigenous immersion program

Charles Darwin University's Indigenous cultural immersion program connects Chinese international students with Indigenous culture and Elders through a series of activities and tours.

In June, students visited Litchfield National Park, where they heard Indigenous stories, learnt about traditions and the deep connection between First Nations people and Country.

National Farmers Federation Agricultural Youth Program – NSW Tour

This program builds relationships between Chinese international and Australian students studying agriculture to learn about Australian food production and techniques.

Following a Victorian tour in October last year, the final 'paddock to port' was in NSW in April. The tour commenced at the Sydney Royal Easter Show before heading to a grain facility near Dubbo, a cattle farm near Tamworth, and an Oyster Farm near Forster. The tour finished at the Australian Export Grains Innovation Centre, where students got a hands-on lesson about why Australian wheat is so highly valued in Asia.

Melbourne Centre for Cities 'Shared Pathways to COP28' City Diplomacy Masterclass

Australia and China share over 100 sister city and state relationships, and city governments are on the frontline of climate action. This program supports local government officials through executive training focused on shared climate action.

City leaders from Australia and China took part in a five-day city diplomacy intensive program, aimed at building capacity for international engagement on shared issues like climate action.

CEO Peter Cai attended the closing reception with Lord Mayor Sally Capp and officials from the Chinese Consulate-General in Melbourne. This event marked the first cohort's successful completion of the program. A second cohort of officials will meet in Hong Kong in July.

ACBC and ANU: Australia-China Decarbonisation Roundtable

In April the Foundation attended the Australia-China Business Council (ACBC) and ANU *Australia-China Decarbonisation Roundtable* in Adelaide. Discussions focused on hydrogen & ammonia, renewables, batteries & grid integration, and minerals processing.

Speakers came from across industry, government and academia. The roundtable is part of the ACBC's Green Channel, supported by the Foundation as an over-arching framework to elevate engagement with China on trade and investment opportunities in support of clean energy transition.

According to the Australian Dragon Boat Federation, there are approximately 178 Dragon Boat teams in Australia, with over 7500 participants from school age through to seniors.

Dragon boat racing was used to celebrate the LGBTQIA+ community at World Pride in Sydney this year, there are Dragon Boat programs that support breast cancer survivors, and it is a sport accessible to those with disabilities.
